Q: How do MAAFPCWDA active efforts differ from ICWA active efforts?

A: ICWA recognizes the inherent rights of political status and protects the best interests of Tribal Nations, and American Indian families and children. Active efforts is one of the required provisions under ICWA to prevent removal and support reunification, requiring rigorous, proactive efforts to support Native families, including involving decisions made with child's tribe(s) and family if absolutely necessary.

Under MAAFPCWDA, 'active efforts' are required to prevent removal and support reunification specific to African American and other disproportionately represented children. Efforts are to be tailored to the cultural needs of children and families, emphasizing engagement with parents, relatives, and families.

Q: What or when will there be a presentation to the judicial system
